Course Description

The MIMG207 course is designed to develop competency in diagnostic procedures of the gastrointestinal system, biliary tract, and genitourinary systems, and breast imaging. Vascular and non-vascular interventional procedures are covered to provide students with knowledge about the techniques used for management of patients with these radiological procedures.

The course content will focus on the patient and equipment preparation, projections and positions followed for each study, use of contrast media, after care of patients and radiographic appearances of different anatomical structures. Students acquire clinical experience in these radiographic procedures in the actual clinical setting under the guidance of an assigned radiographer.

Course Learning Outcomes

At the end of this course the student will be able to:

Contrast Media:

- LO1. Identify the pharmacology and type of radiopaque contrast media and discuss the classifications and route of administration of contrast media employed in imaging procedures.
- LO2. Identify the applications of radiographic contrast media.
- LO3. Describe the adverse side effects and reactions of radiopaque contrast media and identify the screening methods to evaluate patients prior to introduction of radiopaque contrast media.

Gastrointestinal system, biliary tract, and genitourinary system procedures:

- LO4. Identify the anatomy of the gastrointestinal system, biliary tract, and genitourinary system.
- LO5. List and define the indications and the contraindications for the procedures involving the gastrointestinal, biliary tract and genitourinary system.
- LO6. Identify the type of contrast media used for the procedures.
- LO7. Describe the patient preparation for the procedures.
- LO8. List and identify the specialized equipment necessary for the procedures.
- LO9. Describe the patient positioning and projections taken for the procedures.
- LO10. Identify the other imaging modalities used to evaluate the different body systems.
- LO11. Identify the radiographic anatomy of the projections taken and perform image critique.
- LO12. Identify the complications associated with the procedures.

Breast Imaging:

- LO13. Describe the anatomy of the breast



- LO14. Discuss the advantages and disadvantages of the following breast imaging modalities, digital mammography, breast ultrasound, breast magnetic resonance imaging
- LO15. Identify the characteristics of benign and malignant breast lesions
- LO16. Identify the common types of breast cancer.
- LO17. Identify the reasons for breast compression, spot compression and magnification techniques.
- LO18. Describe the proper positioning for the routine and supplementary projections in digital mammography
- LO19. Identify the breast radiographic anatomy of the projections taken and perform image critique.
- LO20. Identify the purpose of breast needle localization
- LO21. Identify and discuss the advantages and disadvantages of the various core biopsy methods.

Vascular and Non-Vascular Interventional Procedures

- LO22. Describe and identify the use, the shape and specifications of catheters, guide wires and accessory items found in interventional suite.
- LO23. List and describe the various vascular and nonvascular interventional procedures that can be performed.
- LO24. List the indications and contraindications for interventional procedures.
- LO25. Discuss vessel access for the interventional procedures.
- LO26. Identify common complications for the interventional procedures.
