A. Course Description:

This course aims to provide students with an understanding of sexuality, sexual health and rights and their dimensions within a framework of human rights. Through discussions, lectures and assignments, students will learn about the evolution of sexuality and sexual health within the global perspective with specific focus on the public health aspect. It will look into the interaction between the biological, social-cultural and health/medical aspects of sexuality and the current discourses surrounding sexuality in Lebanon, the Region, and globally. Some of the issues include: (1) Development of

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sexuality and sexual & gender identities, (2) Sexuality and reproductive health, (3) Sexual rights debates (4) Sexuality_expressions/behaviors and public health, (5) Sexuality, politics, and sexual violence markers.

C. Learning Objectives:

- 1. Define the notions of sexuality, sexual health and rights, and their dimensions; and their importance for health and wellness
- 2. Discuss current concepts/debates of human sexuality within the framework of health and wellbeing in a dynamic and interactive class environment.
- Create a permissive arena for students to examine their beliefs and specific experiences related to various dimensions of their own sexuality and the sexuality of others within a public health perspective.

4. Create a learning environment for sound knowledge and skills development to enhance students' ability to adopt a healthy attitude and behaviors related to their sexuality and sexual health.

D. Learning Outcomes:

By the end of this course, students will be able to:

- Describe the basic definitions, principles, and theories related to human sexuality.
 (Class discussions and mid-term exam, LO1,2)
- 2. Describe and understand the essentials of human sexuality and its relation to reproductive and sexual health & wellness (Class discussions, mid-term exam, LO1, 2,3)
- 3. Identify the range of reproductive and sexual attitudes and behaviors in local and global settings and their impact on public health. (Class discussions, paper assignment, LO2,3,4)
- 4. Apply critical thinking and responsible decision making whilst discussing controversial and emerging issues surrounding the expression and communication of sexuality and sexual rights. (Class discussions, paper assignment, final examLO2, 3)
- 5. Analyze and critically apply the understanding of human sexuality within the framework of public health (Class discussions, paper assignment, final exam, LO1, 2, 3)

E. Teaching Methodology

The course will be conducted by Dr El-Kak with around 30 sessions offered over a whole semester, one session a week. It includes interactive lectures, e-learning, social media, student participation in presentations, open class discussion, and exams.

F. Student evaluation

Evaluation of students will be based on:

1) Class participation & discussions ----- 15 %

This activity involves preparing assignments on related topics of the course and present and discuss in class. It mays to expand student knowledge about a specific topic and stimulate critical thinking around it

2) Case study exams I &II -----50%

This assessment is expected to reflect the capacity of students to reflect and analyze themes related to sexuality and public health based on class discussions and readings through an exam they sit for in class and answer questions on cases or examples (?)
