Course Description

This capstone seminar is taken during the last semester of the Health Communication program. It is linked to the summer internship students are required to complete between their second and third years. The course is designed to challenge students to critically reflect on the knowledge they have gained in all their prior coursework and synthesize that knowledge with field experience, with a focus on the role of health communication in contributing to public health. The course provides students with the opportunity to further develop the full set of competencies essential for a health communication graduate. It also provides them time and space to sharpen their leadership and other professional skills, as well as demonstrate independent thinking and respect for diversity.

Learning Objectives (LOs)

By the end of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Evaluate the role of health communication in contributing to public health in Lebanon
- 2. Apply health communication theories and methodological skills to analysing a "real world" health communication activity
- 3. Critically analyse the role of political, social, and environmental determinants of health in affecting the success or failure of health communication activities
- 4. Utilize effective written and oral communication skills to engage communities and the media
- 5. Demonstrate professionalism, respect for diversity, and independent thinking
